The season of **Epiphany** extends from January 6 until Ash Wednesday, observed this year on February 14. The word "epiphany" means manifestation or illumination, and the biblical readings emphasize the manifestation of Christ in the world. Included among the texts are the stories of the wise men, the baptism of Jesus by John, the calling of the disciples and the early days of Jesus' ministry.



CHILDREN ARE WELCOME IN WORSHIP

Children bring richness to the community gathered at worship. They bring new ways of seeing familiar rituals and often show an understanding of the mystery of the sacraments lost to many adults. Children also bring movement, questions, and wonder. Their presence is essential to the vitality of the church. Here are some tried and true tidbits for parents and children:

- COME EARLY to get a good seat, preferably in front where children can see the action. Children (and adults!) are more likely to fidget if they can't see what's going on.
- SHARE your service bulletin or prayer book with young readers, and help them follow along. Even the youngest like to 'hold the book' like their parents.
- WE UNDERSTAND THAT KIDS are gifted noise-makers without a single thing in their hands! We welcome the sounds of children in worship.
- IF YOUR CHILD IS HAVING A MELTDOWN, feel free to take a break from worship. There is a rocking chair in the lobby!
- COLORING PAGES reflecting themes of the day are available in the display in the hallway.
- A ROCKING CHAIR is available in the hallway for timeouts or for nursing mothers.
- A CHANGING STATION in the Accessible Restroom located across from the small kitchen, by the Memorial Room. Please, ask an Usher if you need assistance.

SPECIAL ASSISTANCE

People have a variety of special needs, and St. David's hopes to be sensitive and responsive to them. To that end, we provide the following information:

- COMMUNION can be brought to you in your seat, should you have mobility issues. Please let the clergy or an usher know of your need.
- THOSE WITH ALLERGIES: The bread contains gluten and the wine contains alcohol. You may receive the Sacrament by receiving both, either, or neither and still receive the full spiritual benefit.





THE FIRST LESSON

Deuteronomy 18:15-20

The Lord promises to raise up a future prophet, like Moses, to continue speaking to the covenant people because they fear a direct experience of God. Although the promise is to be granted, it comes with a price.

oses said, The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. This is what you requested of the LORD your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the LORD my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." Then the LORD replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die."

THE SECOND LESSON

1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Members of the early church were at odds over the practice of eating meat that had been sacrificed to other 'gods.' Paul referees this conflict by urging church members to consider how their actions may impact others.

Tow concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him. Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earthas in fact there are many gods and many lords—yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

THE HOLY GOSPEL Mark 1:21-28

Jesus and his disciples went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.







THE OFFERTORY










INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Possible Dangerous Ice in the Parking Lot

Ice sometimes accumulates in the parking lot during winter months and creates the potential to slip and fall. Please make it your winter habit to drive past the first parking section of the lot as you enter from Grubb Road (between Grubb Rd and the sidewalk entrance with the wrought iron railing). This section is the worst offender.

Although staff and contractors regularly apply ice melt during and immediately following snow and freezing rain, this does not guarantee all ice will be removed. In fact, sometimes we have a most difficult time getting it all melted. So, please stay safe in the winter months by driving further into the parking lot (past the sidewalk entrance).

Winter Expenses

In the winter, property expenses climb due to heating costs, as well as snow & ice removal. Saint David's Church and School is in operation most days from 7 in the morning until 9 at night. Sidewalks and parking lots must be clear and safe. <u>Thanks be to God</u> for the pledges and other monetary offerings that enable us to cover these increased expenses.




