Sunday Morning Worship

Worship is the central unifying act of our life together at St David's and within the Episcopal Church. The beautiful thing about our Episcopal tradition is that we are united not by common belief, but common prayer. So when someone asks what we believe, we can say a few things. We believe that love, justice, mercy, forgiveness, and grace are found in Jesus. And that those things are given freely by God to everyone, because every human being (and every living thing!) is an image-bearer of God. And we can also say come worship with us, because we believe that thee way we pray together shapes what we believe. I have set a goal of building our 10:15 service up to 100 people each Sunday for three reasons: Most importantly, we are called by God to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. This is our mission as Christians. Secondly, our world needs Jesus now more than ever, which means the soil is very fertile! Finally, setting an identified goal helps all of us pull in the same direction. We have a fantastic foundation and a beautiful community that

showers love onto people; we are perfectly situated to grow.

We can do this in a few ways: A older nun was walking with a novice one day and the novice said, "I really don't want to go to mass." "Neither do I," said the older nun. "So let's go to mass." Maybe on that Sunday when we're really feeling like staying home and reading the paper (I have those days too!) come on in to church anyway. You make this place special! Now that our youth program is starting up again, there will be opportunities for youth to serve on the altar and gather for fun and fellowship. When they come and see other youth and kids, it makes them feel like they have community. Finally, we can invite others in our lives to come share in the love and soul-nourishing community that is St David's. The spirit of God in this community is such a healing experience for so many people. Let's continue to share it—I can't wait to see what God does with us this Spring!

Music Ministries

Like the Levites in the Temple in ancient Jerusalem, we seek through Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs to enhance, augment, and deepen the worship through the medium of music. Outreach Means Action

One of the things I love best about St. David's is everyone's generosity in our many Outreach projects. It's shows to me how much everyone cares about those in need. Our committee cooks a monthly meal for Emmanuel Dining Room. We collect food for St. Patrick's Center and Claymont Community Center. We hold used clothing drives and assist at the Clothing Bank of Delaware. Diapers are donated to impoverished new mothers. We collected toiletries, coffee, cleaning supplies, sheets and towels for Homeless Vets. At Christmas gifts are purchased for foster children and St. Patrick's seniors, then followed up with a Christmas Wrapping Party! During Lent we participated in the United Thank Offering. The committee is also charged with determining which groups to support, and how to best financially support the many worthy charities in the community. Our active outreach

members are encouraged to come up with new ideas to help others. The Blessing Bags is our newest venture.

Family Promise of Delaware

Family Promise is a program that keeps families together in the midst of homelessness. Families in need are housed, counseled, aided, and fed during their time of transition into the workforce and a new housing situation/ What a blessing it is to give out of our abundance! Here are some of the ways you can participate.

There are two main categories of giving and doing: **Action Items** and **Supplies**

- Action Items are food items that are
- prepared for a specific meal/date (mains, salads, desserts, bread, butter) and brought to the Memorial Room Kitchen, and then delivered by our volunteers to the Family Promise Center for the evening meal.
- Supplies are those things that can be purchased in advance (paper towels, cleaning supplies, coffee, tea, disposable plates and cutlery, granola bars...) and brought to St. David's.

Faith is deepened for individuals participating in this book group as they come to understand that they have a ministry in this world and that we all have different gifts to share with one another.

Everyone is welcome to be a part of the Wisdom Seekers. Newcomers are always welcomed either from the church community or the larger community.

Carlene Deschaine coordinates the calendar, discussion leaders, Zoom meeting links, and arranges for a local restaurant to accommodate a group of 12-=15 people every 5 or 6 weeks for lunch. Deva Scheel facilitates book selection (5 or 6 from a list of 15-20 books



EfM – Education for Ministry

Hi. I'm Rob Carver and I wanted to take a moment to tell you about my experience in the Education for Ministry Program here at Saint David's, or EfM as we call it.

When I started the program in January of 2020, no one could have envisioned the global pandemic we were about to experience or imagined how much the world would change.

I am grateful to have had EfM each week (via zoom) to help keep me from the deep isolation and separation that affected so many. The spiritual journey that EfM took me on and the fellowship which was formed in our small group not only got me through the pandemic, but it helped usher in a new way of seeing the world around me. My relationship with God has grown stronger and it continues to grow just as I continue to get acquainted with my true self. I don't believe it is an accident that those two things are connected.

The key lesson for me is one received through our weekly readings and theological reflection discussions and by raising lots of questions and doubts about all of it: That the divine is within each of us and all we need to do is listen for it. We do this by sharing our stories with each other and pulling down our masks to reveal our true selves. God never fails in those moments and always provides enough 'God winks' to fill us with confidence we are on the right path.

EfM meets by Zoom each Tuesday evening (with an in-person meeting every 5-6 weeks.) We start our program year in September, and we are always looking for others to join us. Pastoral Care Committee

The Pastoral Care Committee meets once a month to determine where pastoral support is needed and create a plan of action. The chief ministry of Pastoral Care is staying in touch with people in our community. Just visiting, calling, writing notes, and letting them know they are remembered them is very important.

Occasionally, meals are offered during illness or after hospitalization. If this need arises in your household, please contact Jackie Somers in the parish office. Prayer Shawls are provided during long term illness and recovery from surgery. Baby blankets are delivered to new babies. These beautiful prayer shawls and baby blankets are made by members of our congregation and given to Pastoral Care to distribute as needed.

A series of Grief Books is provided for people in the congregation during their first year after a loved one dies. They are sent every few months during the year with a note by a member of the Pastoral Care Committee. They are surprisingly helpful and fitting to the many stages of grief and the passage of time.

A variety of Care Notes Booklets are provided for anyone to pick up and peruse. They are thoughtfully written on various topics as seen through the lens of faith. Care Notes are located on the table in the Narthex near the side door to the church.

Each week a Guild member is assigned to set up and host HH after the 10:15 am service. All parishioners are invited to attend HH following the 10:15 am service for coffee, tea, food, and conversation. Hospitality Hour is a great way to get to know your fellow parishioners and learn more about St. Davids and the community.

We enjoy what we do because we love hosting, and a little coffee/tea and food is a great way to bring people together. St. Davids is an inviting,

inclusive, and growing community and our sponsors and hosts provide the means to bring people together, as well as providing a venue where Newcomers can become incorporated into the community. Our Guild members are all individuals with their own unique talents and creativity. We operate within a set budget and guidelines, and the rest is up to the host's own creativity and time. 
St. David's Online Presence

Livestream Crew

There's no doubt the pandemic changed a lot of things, including the way we worship. During those early days of social distancing, almost every church turned to virtual worship to keep services going. Now many, including St. David's have kept this online option going.

My son Luke and I are among the small group (with the leadership of Jackie Sommers!) that make the 10:15 service available live on Facebook on Sundays. People can also watch it online later in the week if they can't join live.

It's a fairly simple ministry. There's a little bit of set up to get the broadcast on Facebook. From there, make sure one of the two cameras is focused on what's currently happening and set up the other for what's next. Then, switch cameras using the cues Jackie provides each week. What could be easier than that? (Unless a priest/rector goes rogue, but that rarely happens....)

I believe this ministry is about building and maintaining community. It allows those who are sick and can't attend to remain connected to weekly services and the community. It allows those who've moved to check-in occasionally and keep their connection to our community. And it allows Newcomers a chance to check St. David's out before taking the sometime intimidating step of joining us in person -

and hopefully joining our community.

It's a great ministry for those who want to contribute to the community, but have limited time. You are coming to the service anyway, so why not experience it from a different perspective once a month or so? And for young people like Luke, it's a ministry that puts them in familiar digital territory while helping them feel more a part of what's going on.

If you remember how going to church virtually helped keep you connected with St. David's during the pandemic, remember there are people making that happen each week for those who can't be there now – and you can be one of those people too.

Building Up the Body of Christ: Words of Hope and Direction from the Leadership of the Vestry

Words from the Senior Warden of the Vestry

What service do you provide to your members, the parish, or outside world?

As Senior Warden of the Vestry, I feel that in this time in the life of the Church, when laity and clergy are recognizing the benefits of shared leadership, the call means working collaboratively with fellow Vestry members and the Rector to create a vision and plan of action that reflects God's dream for the congregation. It means cultivating congregation-wide conversations about where God is calling your faith community. It means balancing your role in discerning God's mission and vision with sound stewardship of its property and resources."

How does the Vestry act and function?

"The shared responsibilities of the Vestry and the Rector can be described roughly as

- Discernment of God's call
- Identification of new leaders
- Stewardship and development of resources
- Special duties when a congregation is without a rector

We are convinced that the most important of these is discernment. The primary tasks for a vestry are discerning what God is calling your faith community to do and articulating a hopeful vision of the church and the world as God's mission. A clear mission and strong vision create a firm foundation for your decisions and actions."

How does the Vestry nurture/enrich the life of the Church? Parish? Community?

"The Episcopal Church reflects the sweeping changes in American life and culture in the twenty-first century. As the United States grows more diverse, so do our churches. The fastest-growing demographic in The Episcopal Church

is Latino members, with Asian membership, particularly in the West, coming in second. Evolving digital communications are bringing new ways for congregations to build community, network, and explore their faith. Greater fluidity in religious choice brings us new members from a variety of faith traditions."

How does your ministry inform your faith? OR...how does your faith inform your ministry??

"But your faith community is also where you wrestle with questions of faith and find meaning and purpose for your life. It's where life's small and large events are marked and celebrated. So there is an important element of shared life and purpose in vestry leadership. You're not just elected to the vestry; you are called to a sacred ministry in your faith community."

Why do you enjoy being part of this ministry?

"Election to the vestry is exciting—a sign of your congregation's confidence in you. But it can also be daunting. The challenges our churches face today can make a vestry person wonder at Jesus' promise that his yoke is easy and his burden is light. We at ECF are in agreement, though, with retired bishop Henry Parsley. He writes in a Vestry Papers article that he misses vestry meetings. "Vestries should be one of the most exciting ministries in the church—joyful, in fact," he writes. "Healthy, effective vestries make healthy, effective parishes. When rectors and vestries work together as a well-aligned team, extraordinary things happen for the mission of God."

Everyone loves taking care of their house, condo, or apartment by cleaning, providing maintenance, doing upgrades, and finally waiting for the repair person to come fix something between 8 and 12 noon!? Hopefully that repair person showed up on time! What do you think it takes to do the same for our St. David's home has 60,000 square feet, 12 HVAC systems, 6 roofs, 300 plus doors, thousands of square feet of glass/windows, two kitchens, and I did mention the 10 bathrooms? Geez, I forgot the lawn and garden maintenance, snow removal, con-




Parish Office & Administration


